RSV Quick Facts

RSV is a common, contagious, and potentially serious respiratory virus that usually causes mild symptoms but can lead to hospitalization.

Older adults are more at risk for severe infections from RSV because our immune system typically weakens as we age.

Adults with certain underlying medical conditions, including chronic heart or lung disease, are at an increased risk of developing serious RSV infection. These include:

Asthma

Chronic Heart Chronic Obstructive Failure (CHF) Pulmonary Disease (COPD)
